- What do the education we received and the market tell us about the value of money?
- What is more valuable, to be or to have? Why?
- Explain the following maxims.
 - ✓ "It will be very hard for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of heaven. Why?"

- ✓ What has real value cannot be bought
- ✓ What can be bought has little or no value

Thoughts for AN Input by the Moderator

- Money in itself is neither good nor bad. It's God's creature.
- Greed for money is bad.
- With money we can do good and evil all depends on how much we value it
- The problem is not to possess money but to be possessed by it!
- Dissatisfaction with what we have makes us unhappy.
- Money is given to us by God "in trust", to use it, not to hoard it or to squander it.
- We are administrators not owners.
- To think we need lots of money to be happy keeps us forever unhappy..
- We need a minimum reasonable amount of possessions to lead a decent human life, but not wealth and luxuries.
- Poverty, if it means frugality and simple living, is not bad. Destitution is !
- Jesus was neither a destitute, nor a rich man.
- Accepting our lot in life, even if it means being poor, is the secret of happiness.
- The desire to have than others is a hot bed of jealousy.
Competition is bad, emulation is right.
- We aren't born to compete, but to cooperate.
- The spirit of the world, advertising and the consumerist society we live in are the main causes of our unhappiness.
- Poor self-image very often prompts us to boost our "ego" with status symbols and the trappings of wealth.
- We judge the worth of others, by what they have, not by they are!
- Comparing our wealth and possessions with those of others is a source of unhappiness and rivalries.
- The books we read, the movies we enjoy, the ads thrust on us make us believe that money can buy joy, peace, contentment. It's all a blatant lie! We swallow it, hook, line and sinker!

APPENDIX ONE Activities (Optional)

Instructions for the moderator

Time being available does not skip the activities. They are very effective to drive home to the participants the lessons of the day.

The afternoon hours are best suited for them.

a) Preparation of the Activities

- ✓ Divide the participants in into smaller groups.
- ✓ Give to each group one of the following N.T. texts:

1. The Rich Fool.	Lk 12:13-21.
2. The Rich Man and Lazarus.	Lk 16:19-31.
3. The Rich Young Man.	Mk 10:17-31.
4. The Shrewd Manager.	Lk 16:1-13.
5. Judas' case. Money corrupted him.	Mt 26:14-15 & 27:3-5.
- ✓ Ask them to prepare some activities, for instance, role-plays, radio plays, either in their ordinal form or in modern set-ting..

A novel way of presentation could be the following:

- 1) One member of the group will play the main character of the passage, i.e. the Rich Fool, Judas, the Young Rich Man, the Shrewd Manager,
- 2) The other members of the group will try to convince him of his mistaken attitude towards money.
- 3) He will stoutly defend his position (the mentality of the world).
- 4) Finally, the outcome of the play will prove him wrong.

b) Presentation

When the time given for preparation is over, the groups will get together.

Each group will present its activity to the house.

After each presentation, there will be a short analysis and evaluation.

APPENDIX TWO Prayer Service

- ✓ End the event with a prayer session.
- ✓ Begin the prayer session with a short silent "personal prayer".
- ✓ Read Mt 6:19 "Riches in heaven".
- ✓ Comment on it. Lead a little meditation on it.
- ✓ Leave the participants alone with God and ask them to examine their attitudes towards money and riches.
- ✓ You may read the "beatitudes", Mt 5:3-10, or God and Possession, Mt 6:24-34..
- ✓ Reflection. Is there anything they should do about it?
- ✓ End with a group shared prayer.
- ✓ Encourage participatory prayer
- ✓ Sing some hymns like "Seek First the Kingdom of Heaven".
