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Intent of the Story

- ✓ *God has to be worshipped in Spirit and in Truth*

6. Why do kings and wealthy people build sumptuous and luxurious temples to God?
7. In order to pray and find God, where should we go and what should we do?.
8. Which were the favorite places Jesus used to pray? Mention them.
9. Why Jesus did choose those spots?

4. Do you find God and serve him among the poor and needy? How? Why?

IDEAS FOR AN INPUT

- God cannot be locked or kept in golden temples and palaces made by men
- God is the Master of all creation. The whole universe is his temple.
- Our temples and churches should be devout, quiet, simple and inviting to prayer, not necessarily palaces and luxurious buildings
- God is found in the depths of the human heart, specially the simple, and the poor and humble people
- Jesus did go to the Temple of Jerusalem at certain times and prescribed festivals but most of the time, he prayed and preached outside the Temple
- Jesus found God his Father mainly among the poor, the illiterate, the sick, the children, the simple, the hungry and sinners
- The Shepherds had to go to a cave and stable, to find Jesus
- The Magi could not find Jesus in the Palace of King Herod, nor in the temple of Jerusalem, but in a simple dwelling in Bethlehem.
- The best temples God has made for Himself are the humble, loving hearts of men and women
- By shunning the poor and the needy, we shun God
- God has to be worshipped in spirit and in truth, not precisely in this or that temple.

NEW TESTAMENT TEXTS ON PRAYING AND WORSHIPPING GOD NOT NECESSARILY IN THE TEMPLE BUT EVERYWEHRE.

- Mt 2/12 The Magi found Jesus neither in the Temple nor in the palace of Herod.
- Mt 3/12 John the Baptist preached to the people not in the temple, but in the desert
- Mt 4/11 Jesus spends 40 days in the desert fasting and praying preparing himself for his public ministry
- Mt Chp.5, 6, & 7 The Greatest Teachings of Jesus “The Sermon of the Mount” were given to us in the open fields but on a Mount. “
- Mt 6/5-6 When you want to pray shut yourself in your room and pray alone before your Heavenly Father.
- Mt 9/35-38 Jesus keeps preaching through towns and villages

- Mt 17/1-13 Jesus goes to a high mountain to transfigure himself and show his glory to his disciples.
- Mt 24/12 Jesus predicts the destruction of the temple
- Mt 25/31-46 To serve others is to serve God (Last Judgment)
- Mt 26/36-46 Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane
- Mk 1/35-39 Jesus prays in lonely places
- Mk 3/12 Jesus preaches on the bank of the Lake
- Mk 3/13-15 Jesus prays for a whole night on a hill
- Mk 6/45-47 After the multiplication of bread and fish, Jesus pray all alone on a hill
- Mk 7/6-8 We have to honor God with our hearts, not with our lips
- Lk 1/46-53 Canticle of our Lady, God cares for the down trodden and the hungry
- Lk 2/8-20 The Shepherds find Jesus in a cave and in a stable
- Lk 9/1-6 Jesus sends his disciples out to the whole world to preach to the poor and sick.
- Jn 2/13-17 Jesus drives away the merchants from the Temple. The Temple is a House of prayer, not of business

APPENDIX

FROM A HOMILY ON MATTHEW BY SAINT JOHN CHRYSOSTOM,

Do not adorn the church and ignore your afflicted brother

Do you want to honor Christ's body? Then do not scorn him in his nakedness, nor honor him here in the church with silken garments while neglecting him outside where he is cold and naked. For he who said: This is my body, and made it so by his words, also said: You saw me hungry and did not feed me, and inasmuch as you did not do it for one of these, the least of my brothers, you did not do it for me.

What we do here in the church requires a pure heart, not special garments; what we do outside requires great dedication. Let us learn, therefore, to be men of wisdom and to honor Christ as he desires. For a person being honored finds greatest pleasure in the honor he desires, not in the honor we think best. Peter thought he was honoring Christ when he refused to let him wash his feet; but what Peter wanted was not truly an honor, quite the opposite!

Give him the honor prescribed in his law by giving your riches to the poor. For God does not want golden vessels but golden hearts. Now, in saying this I am not forbidding you to make such gifts; I am only demanding that along with such gifts and before them you give alms. He accepts the former, but he is much more pleased with the latter. In the former, only the giver profits; in the latter, the recipient does too.

A gift to the church may be taken as a form of ostentation, but alms is pure kindness. Of what use is it to weigh down Christ's table with golden cups, when he himself is dying of

hunger? First, fill him when he is hungry; then use the means you have left to adorn his table. Will you have a golden cup made but not give a cup of water? What is the use of providing the table with cloths woven of gold thread, and not providing Christ himself with the clothes he needs? What profit is there in that?

Tell me: If you were to see him lacking the necessary food but were to leave him in that state and merely surround his table with gold would he be grateful to you or rather would he not be angry? What if you were to see him clad in worn-out rags and stiff from the cold, and were to forget about clothing him and instead were to set up golden columns for him, saying that you were doing it in his honor? Would he not think he was being mocked and greatly insulted?

Apply this also to Christ when he comes along the roads as a pilgrim, looking for shelter. You do not take him in as your guest, but you decorate floor and walls and the capitals of the pillars. You provide silver chains for the lamps, but you cannot bear even to look at him as he lies chained in prison.

Once again, I am not forbidding you to supply these adornments; I am urging you to provide these other things as well, and indeed to provide them first. No one has ever been accused for not providing ornaments, but for those who neglect their neighbor a hell awaits with an inextinguishable fire and torment in the company of the demons. Do not, therefore, adorn the church and ignore your afflicted brother, for he is the most precious temple of all.
